Course Description

Lecture and directed listening on the elements, forms and historic chronology of Western music. This is a survey course designed to introduce the non-music major to the basic building blocks of musical composition, the instruments of the orchestra, musical styles of the Great Periods of Western art music and the lives and major works of representative composers from each period. Along the way, my hope is that you will develop critical listening skills, which will enhance your enjoyment of music.

The course is divided into 4-basic sections after the Introduction:

1. Basic Musical Concepts
2. Building Blocks of Sound
3. The Organizing Elements of Music
4. Historical Periods

The 4 sections are subdivided into Classes 1-40; those are for organizational purposes only as a recommended pace of study. The course will be presented in its entirety from day one, and you can move through the content at your own pace. It will be up to you to read, study, listen and complete the lessons, assessments and assignments at your own pace.

The college requires the reporting of the first set of HQV grades within the first week of the course, so to avoid being dropped from the class, registration needs to be completed and meaningful participation in the form of coursework submissions need to happen by September 10, 2019

As a result of successfully completing this course, you will be able to:

1. Name, define and describe the elements of music
2. Name, define and identify the instruments of the orchestra
3. Name, define and describe the absolute forms utilized in one of the Great Period Styles of Western art music
4. Listen to randomly played works and identify four features of each

Concert Reflection Paper

One of the large assignments in this course is a Concert Reflection Paper. The details of what is required in the paper can be found in **Class 20**. For this assignment, you will need to plan ahead. You must attend a symphony orchestra concert, opera, or musical in order to complete it. As long as it is a symphony orchestra concert, opera, or a musical, any event is OK. If you go to a musical, try to find a "professional" rather than a "community" production. In any case, you must find a way to see the orchestra at some point in the performance (they are usually in the "pit"—and yes, that's what it's called). Please don't attend a high school production as points will be deducted from your overall grade. I would recommend you run your choice of concert by me for approval, if you have any doubts about its appropriateness.

Attendance Policy

Even though the course is self-guided and self-paced, the college requires me to submit evidence of relevant course engagement throughout the semester. In compliance with Federal Title IV funding requirements, as well as college initiatives, reporting of student participation in classes will occur at two designated times each semester. I will assign one of two non-transcripted letter symbols to each student during each reporting period (see below). Students identified as no longer participating will be dropped or administratively withdrawn from the class, and students identified as needing academic assistance will be contacted.

Participation/Progress Symbols

- H – The student is not doing acceptable work and needs **H**elp to be successful.
- Q – The student has not participated and the instructor believes they have unofficially withdrawn (**Q**uit). These students will be dropped/withdrawn from the class.
- V – The instructor **V**erifies that the student is participating and doing acceptable work.
