Course Description

Students use the nursing process to implement the caregiver role with adult clients experiencing basic physiologic needs. How disease states of core systems alter clients' needs and their ability to meet these needs will be explored. Clinical experience will provide the student the opportunity to demonstrate the roles of nursing judgement and spirit of inquiry.

Exam Process- Respondus

To protect the fairness and integrity of the exams, students will be required to take exams using Respondus Lockdown Browser and Monitor. This is an online test proctoring software that requires a download to your computer. Training and practice of Respondus technology will be provided in advance of the first exam. A Mac or PC that has a webcam and microphone is required to use Respondus. If you do not have this technology, please contact your instructor right away. Students are expected to complete the Respondus Practice quiz on time. This is to give our IT department time to help troubleshoot issues before exam 1 begins. Failure to complete the Respondus quiz on time may result in instructor-initiated drop

Student Evaluation Criteria

Each course may contain one or more grading components. One component will consist of tests. Other components may consist of quizzes, group work, papers, clinical, or other activities. A student must earn a minimum of 78% in the test component **and** a minimum of 78% average in the course in order to pass the course. A student who earns less than 78% in the test component **or** less than a 78% average in the course will receive a maximum grade of 1.5 in the course, must step out of the program and will not be able to continue to PNC 130. **See Nursing Handbook for progression policies.**

No questions are allowed during testing unless it is a definition question. <i>All exams will be taken through JetNet exam software.</i> When grading tests, faculty reserves the right to not count questions that they deem are not of good quality.
II. QUIZZES / GROUP WORK	10 %	Quizzes, including ATI Practice Assessments, may be given based on readings throughout the course. VI. PROFESSIONAL CREDENTIALS	Satisfactory OR – 3% off final course grade	It is the student’s professional responsibility to keep all records updated in the nursing office and in their personal portfolio. This include, but is not limited to, health assessment form, TB skin test, CPR, vaccinations, etc. Failure to update this information by the first clinical day of any clinical course will result in a 3% reduction of the final course grade and may mean missed clinical days and possible failure in the course (see Nursing Handbook).

Each test will be graded utilizing the above scale. When calculating final grades if the percentage includes a decimal, 0.5 or more the grade will be rounded up to the next whole number (e.g., 83.5=84). If a decimal grade of 0.4 or less is calculated the grade will be rounded down to the nearest whole number (e.g. 83.4 = 83). If the faculty decides that a test question is not valid, everyone in the course receives one point for that question whether they got the question “right or wrong”. (This is not an additional point if the question was scored as being correct).

Testing: Course Exams

Testing is one method to assess content mastery and critical thinking. Course testing will contribute to 70 – 90% of the course grade. Faculty developed exams are administered as timed tests and written to simulate the NCLEX-PN which is a timed exam. Students will be provided one and a half minutes per test item.

If a student is unable to take any test, he/she must contact their faculty prior to the scheduled test. Students taking tests late may be penalized as outlined in the individual course syllabus. See Appendix H for Student Testing Agreement.

Some nursing courses will require testing outside of the class time. Students should plan for this additional time in their schedules. Be aware of the hours the Jackson College Testing Center is open, the time needed to take each test, and instructions for taking the tests. A picture ID is required upon entering the Testing Center for testing.

Jackson College Nursing Department Testing/Practicum/Skill Guidelines for Students:

1. All student possessions (backpacks, cell-phones, water bottles, hats, etc.) must be left at the front or sides of the room – not under individual desks or tables.
2. Students are not permitted to sit at their desk with notes prior to the test. Any last-minute studying must be conducted outside the classroom.
3. The student may have only a pencil, scrap paper, simple calculator with no memory (if warranted) and earplugs as warranted by faculty. Watches and cell phones are not allowed.

4. Once class begins, students are not permitted to sit at their desk with class notes and or text prior to the test. Last minute studying or review must be conducted outside the classroom.
5. Students are not allowed to remove any testing material from the testing/classroom.
6. If a student must take an exam at a different time than the rest of the class due to an illness or emergency, a different exam is given.
7. Bathroom breaks will not be permitted during any exam or quiz.
8. There will be no discussion of test items between the student and faculty on the day of the test.
9. Students who disagree with the answers may complete a Student Test Item Query form to explain their rationale for their chosen answer. These forms will be submitted to the faculty for consideration.
10. Students will be given 1.5 minutes per test item.
11. Students must pass a Dosage Calculation Competency at 90% within three attempts. Failure to obtain a 90% results in failure of the course.
12. All faculty will only remediate general concepts/and or question item rationale. No individual questions will be reviewed with students in an online course environment.
13. There will be defined timeframes that students must complete skills demonstrations. The purpose of skills test items incorporates the designated response time for patient safety and provider efficiency in the clinical setting. Specific timeframes are published in course syllabi.
14. NRS 111 and PNC 111 students will be allowed a maximum of 3 attempts to demonstrate competency of each required skill.

Student Responsibilities: Class Requirements

Attendance

Classroom attendance is not mandatory but is HIGHLY recommended. The student is responsible for his or her own learning. In the event the student must miss or be late to class, it is the student's responsibility to obtain lecture notes, messages, instructions, announcements, etc. from a fellow student. The student will be held responsible for ALL material and information regardless of whether the student was in class. Lecture content will be delivered through in class lecture or taped PowerPoint presentations uploaded to JetNet. Students are responsible for downloading and watching the lectures. Students are responsible for all content delivered during the taped lectures and through additional assignments.

Make Up Policy

Students are strongly encouraged to be present for all exams. If an urgent or extraordinary situation arises that prevents a student from taking an examination, the student must call the instructor who is testing prior to the exam to arrange a makeup. The student **must take the missed exam before returning to class**. Students who have already taken the exam are NOT to share any part of the exam with students who have not yet taken the exam – see policy on cheating.

NOTE: The first time a student misses an exam, 5% will be deducted from the earned exam grade if the faculty member has not been notified before the test. 5% will be deducted from each subsequent late exam whether or not the student notifies the instructor prior to the exam. Students must be present in class to participate in and receive credit for group work or quizzes. Tardiness to class may mean missing group work or a quiz, or reduced time to take the quiz or exam.

Course Communications

Course communications will be made through JetNet and the Jackson College email system. All students must utilize their JC email when sending email communications to faculty regarding the course and clinical. It is the student's responsible to check email frequently. Students are accountable for all communications made via email.

Written Work

Written work should be neatly done using proper grammar, spelling and punctuation, and sentence structure. Written work with three or more spelling errors or with improper sentence structure will be unsatisfactory.

Reading Assignments

Reading assignments (text, assigned articles, handouts, etc.) should be read for understanding before coming to class for which they are assigned. Class discussions and group critical thinking exercises will be based on the student coming prepared to class. Students are encouraged to bring questions to class. Some questions, however, will be best answered following lecture because of limited class time.

Testing

Testing will be done from content objectives found in course learning guides. A student will be allowed to take a make-up test only 1 time without penalty. Cell phones and apple watches may not be out during testing or while reviewing an exam. If a student is found to have a cell phone out during testing or during test review the student will receive a zero on the test in question.

If a student has a question or concern regarding the test or a test question a student needs to complete a Test Inquiry Form within one week of the test. Students will not be allowed to complete a Test Inquiry Form or review test concepts after the review timeframe has expired.

Dosage Calculation Competency Policy

One of the most important nursing skills to master is safe and accurate administration of client medications. Students are expected to have prior knowledge of essential mathematic skills needed for accurate calculation of medication dosages. Students have access to several resources to facilitate success. Some of these include Kaplan Dosage and Calculation program, Math Magic, tutoring at the Center for Student Success, and Jackson College library resources.

The Jackson College Nursing Department has established a program-wide Dosage Calculation Competency requirement. Additional information may be found in specific course syllabi.

Below are the nursing department policy guidelines:

1. All level 2 and 3 students enrolled in a clinical nursing course complete a 10-question, 30- minute quiz achieving a score greater than or equal to 90% with a maximum of 3 attempts.
2. All quiz questions are fill in the blank.
3. All calculations for each question must be clearly documented to receive credit.
4. All answers submitted for grading must be documented in a specified area, either a box or line to receive credit for the question.
5. Each question is worth one point. No partial credit is given.
6. General rounding guidelines apply. Rounding requirements for each question will be specified.
7. IV drops are rounded to whole numbers.
8. Proper use of zeros is required: 23 2020-2021 a. Do not use trailing zeros - [Write 5 mg not 5.0 mg]. b. Doses less than one measurement unit require a leading zero - [Write 0.5 not .5].
9. Rounding requirements will be stated within each question.
10. Failure to satisfactorily achieve the above stated requirements results in a course failure with a maximum grade of a 1.5 for the course.

Grading Tests

When grading tests, faculty reserves the right to not count questions that they deem are not of good quality. In this situation, all answers will be accepted for the question(s) discarded. No additional point will be given to the student who had the question "right" prior to it being discarded. Calculation and Select-All-That-Apply questions are not eligible to be discarded.

Standardized Testing

The use of ATI (Assessment Technologies Institute) resources will be incorporated into this course. Any proctored ATI assessments are mandatory and an incomplete for the course will be awarded until the exam(s) are completed. **(See *Standardized Testing Policy in the Jackson College Nursing Handbook.*)**

SATA Questions

The Moodle testing format awards partial credit for SATA (Select All That Apply) questions. Partial credit will not be awarded for SATA questions. Students must select only the correct responses to earn credit on these questions. When a test is completed on Moodle students need to be aware the posted score is considered a “raw” score. SATA questions will be hand-graded once the test is complete which may result in the test score going down. There will be SATA questions on every test.

Student Responsibilities: Clinical Requirements

- Due to the requirements established by our clinical partners, students who are not registered for clinical sections prior to agency deadlines will be assigned to their clinical section. Once lead faculty have submitted course rosters into ACEMAPP students are unable to switch groups without permission from their lead faculty.
- Attendance in clinical is required and is very important. All missed clinical days must be made up. Please refer to the attendance policy in the Jackson College Student Nursing Handbook – PNC. The student must satisfactorily complete PNC 130 Medical Surgical Nursing II with a minimum 2.0 grade before progressing to PNC 140 Medical Surgical Nursing III and PNC 170 Entry into Practice.
- The student is required to call the clinical unit before clinical starts if she/he will be absent or late. Excessive tardiness, defined as being late two times in the clinical area will result in a warning notice as outlined in the Nursing Handbook. Students may not be late due to COVID-19 screening procedures.
- The student must come prepared to the clinical area. If the student comes unprepared, she/he will be given a performance notice warning and will be sent home from clinical resulting in an absence that must be made up. If there is an additional incidence, further disciplinary action will be taken as defined in the Nursing Handbook in addition to being sent home from clinical resulting in another absence that must be made up. If there is a third incidence of unsatisfactory clinical preparation, the student will fail the clinical portion of the class.
- The students should be attired and groomed as defined in the Nursing Handbook. The instructor reserves the right to determine appropriate dress in any given situation based on the uniform policy.
- The Clinical Performance Guide (CPG) presents all clinical objectives as identified in the clinical evaluation tool in addition to detailing skills and abilities that will further assist the individual student to satisfactorily meet clinical objectives, actively engage in his/her own self-assessment, demonstrate accountability for learning and promote self-growth. The student’s weekly recording in the CPG provides both faculty and the student with a method to monitor the student’s

experience and progression toward meeting clinical objectives. The individual student and faculty will jointly review the student's self-assessment and progress as noted in the CPG in the faculty's evaluation of the student's satisfactory attainment of clinical objectives. Satisfactory (S), Unsatisfactory (U), Not applicable/Not available (NA), with detailed comments will be used as grading criteria.

- The CPG presents mandatory clinical objectives which the student must satisfactorily attain in order to pass the course. Students will be evaluated according to a satisfactory (S) or unsatisfactory (U) grading criteria. If the clinical objectives are not met, the clinical grade will be unsatisfactory, and the course grade will be a failure of 1.5.
- **CELL PHONE AND TEXTING POLICY:** Cell phone calls and texting are not appropriate in the clinical setting due to the risk of distractors, errors, and HIPAA violations. Unit phone numbers are available in case of emergency.
- Alternative clinical assignments will be assigned to students during the semester. These assignments must be completed by the end of the clinical day and should be viewed as a clinical day.
- **Written Clinical Assignments:** The student's clinical preparation each clinical week will include:
 - Long data base assessments or short data assessments (client head-to-toe)
 - Medication Tracking Sheets
 - Laboratory Summary with abnormal values and relevant normal
 - Pathophysiology's- at least two per Nursing Care Plan
 - You will complete two nursing care plans (NCP) in PCN 120 clinical using the Concept/Care map forms provided. See Concept/Care Map Grading Sheet for the grading criteria. The first will be due the third or fourth week of clinical; the second NCP will be due the week before clinical ends. Grading of concept/care maps will be on a Satisfactory or Unsatisfactory basis according to criteria defined in the Nursing Care Plan Grading Sheet.

Each clinical instructor will notify students of the deadline for submission of the clinical paperwork. The weekly paperwork is not graded. It is a tool to help evaluate the student's ability to critically think. The weekly paperwork is required unless alternative assignments are given for the week. Failure to submit clinical assignments will result in a Clinical Performance Notice.

- **AGENCY POLICIES:** It is the student's responsibility to be informed and adhere to agency policies such as student parking, orientation modules, smoking, cell phones, Covid protocols, EMR documentation, and HIPPA. Failure to follow agency policy can result in the agency

prohibiting the student from continuing the clinical experience at said agency. This may result in course failure and/or dismissal from the JC nursing program.

Attendance Policy

Whether in a traditional classroom course or online course, regular class participation and keeping up on the reading and assignments is strongly correlated with survival in college. It is my recommendation that you plan to do your assignments and take your exams BEFORE the last day they are due. If problems occur, there is time to fix them before the deadline.

In compliance with Federal Title IV funding requirements, as well as college initiatives, I will be monitoring student participation on a regular basis and officially reporting student activity throughout the term to

assure compliance with college policy and federal regulations. It is imperative that you log in to the course and actively participate *within the first couple days of the term* to validate your enrollment in the course. After that, not actively participating in class may result in you being withdrawn from the course. Being withdrawn from a course can have an impact on financial aid, billing, athletic eligibility, and housing status. As a college student you are responsible for how your participation impacts your academic progress; the accountability lies with you.
