Course Description

Students will review the ethical/legal responsibilities of the LPN along with the scope of practice of the LPN as defined by the Michigan Nurse Practice Act. Issues related to types of health care organizations, LPN organizations, continuing education, and licensure will be covered. NCLEX-PN and licensure forms will be received with instructions regarding completion of forms as well as the testing / licensure process. Information on the search for employment and job-seeking skills will be included.

Instructional Methods

Instructional methods/teaching strategies include, but are not limited to, the following: Collaborative/group work, various community site observations, assigned readings, guest speakers, writing projects, discussions, lecture, audiovisual material, handouts, JetNet course resources.

Grading Procedure

Each course may contain one or more grading components. One component will consist of tests. Other components may consist of quizzes, group work, papers, clinical, or other activities. A student must earn a minimum of 78% in the test component **and** a minimum of 78% average in the course in order to pass the course. A student who earns less than 78% in the test component **or** less than a 78% average in the course will receive a maximum grade of 1.5 in the course, must step out of the program and will not be able to continue to PNC 150. **See Nursing Handbook for progression policies.**

Assignments are due ON TIME according to the tentative class schedule, or as directed by the Instructor. Assignments submitted after the due date will be subject to a five percent (5%) grade reduction for every day the assignment is late.

The student will be held responsible for all material and information regardless of whether the student was in class.
2. **Students must be present in class to participate in and receive credit for group work and quizzes (if applicable). Tardiness to class may mean missing group work or quizzes.**
3. Reading assignments (text, assigned articles, handouts, etc.) should be read for understanding ***before*** coming to the class for which they are assigned. Students are encouraged to fill in outlines, and bring questions to class. Some questions, however, will be best answered following class because of limited class time.
4. Students are expected to be courteous of others in the classroom. Students who talk and disrupt the class inappropriately will be asked to leave the room. Faculty expects students to be kind to one another and to faculty at all times, and faculty will reciprocate.
5. Students will be expected to dress professionally and maintain professional conduct at all times in the classroom. ***Refer to Nursing Handbook.***

6. Students are responsible for finding out the meaning of any unfamiliar words or terms encountered in the readings, classroom, or clinical area.
7. All written work should be neatly done using proper grammar, spelling, punctuation, and sentence structure. Written work with three or more spelling errors or grammatical errors will be unsatisfactory. Utilize APA format, or as directed by the Instructor.
8. Students are responsible for previously learned material.
9. If a student does not understand content or instructions, he or she is expected to seek instructor guidance.
10. Testing will be done from course objectives found in course syllabi outlines. Cell phones, smart watches (ie: Apple watches), or any other recording devices may not be out during testing. If a student is found to have a cell phone out during testing, the student will receive a zero on the test in question.

USE OF ELECTRONIC DEVICES IN CLASS: While the nursing faculty recognizes that communication with family and friends is important, the use of cell phones and beepers in class is very distracting to other students and to your instructor. Please keep all electronic devices on either vibrate or voice mail mode during class. If you are experiencing a family emergency and must keep a cell phone on, please obtain instructor permission prior to class. We appreciate your cooperation in providing an environment conducive to learning for all students. **Students must have instructor permission to record class and/or lab, either using a voice recorder or video recorder.**

Clinical Requirements

1. Attendance in clinical is required and very important. All Clinical Time and Work Must Be Made Up. If the clinical absence equals or exceeds (1) one hour (60 minutes), the student will be required to make-up all time missed. Missing clinical time can lead to failure in a nursing course. If a student misses (1) one hour or more of clinical the student must notify the course lead faculty to arrange a make-up assignment. Students will receive an (I) incomplete pending the successful completion of all clinical assignments and responsibilities, as well as the make-up clinical time before a course grade will be submitted. Students who have less than one hour of missed clinical time will be assigned learning experiences within the time frame designated by the instructor. Please refer to the attendance policy in the Nursing Handbook
 - **The student must notify the course lead instructor to discuss and plan makeup arrangements.**
2. The student is required to call the clinical instructor before assigned time if she/he will be absent or late. If the student will be absent from a scheduled outpatient observation clinical day, the student will notify the agency at which the clinical observation was scheduled, and the lead course instructor so that alternative plans can be made. Excessive tardiness, defined as being late two times in clinical area & will result in a written performance notice as outlined in the Nursing

Handbook.

3. ***The use of cell phones, text messaging, instant messaging, and/or pagers is prohibited during clinical hours. If there is a family emergency, the student may be contacted through the facility operator.***

4. **Clinical Written Assignments:**

The majority of written assignments for this course consist of completion of objectives focused on each of the external clinical sites that the student is assigned to. These should be completed and turned into Darlene LoPresto no later than one (1) week after the assigned site engagement.

1. **Clinical Evaluation Tool:**

The Clinical Evaluation Tool presents all clinical objectives, in addition to skills and abilities that will assist the student to satisfactorily meet clinical objectives, actively engage in his/her own self-assessment, demonstrate accountability for learning, and promote self-growth. Satisfactory (S), Unsatisfactory (U), and Not Applicable or Not Available (NA), will be used as grading criteria. If the clinical objectives are not met, the clinical grade will be unsatisfactory, and the course grade will be a failure (1.5).

The student's and instructor's daily recording in the Summary of Medication Pass Form provides a method for monitoring the student's experience and his/her progression toward meeting clinical objectives. The student and instructor will jointly review the student's Clinical Performance Guide/Evaluation Tool at the end of the clinical rotation. If at any time during the semester the student would like additional feedback, he/she is encouraged to contact the instructor.

6. **Simulations:**

Simulation days are virtual clinical days or performed on campus in the Simulation lab, therefore ***completion is mandatory***. All assigned virtual clinicals will be done with the Swift River product (and ATI as needed). All virtual clinical assignments must be completed to be included in required 45 clinical hours. Failure to complete virtual or community location clinical assignments may lead to failure of this course. Faculty reserve the right to substitute other meaningful experiences for simulation deeming unforeseen circumstances.

7. **Revised Nursing Department COVID-19 Policy**

In courses that have scheduled live and/or synchronous clinical experiences, students who have been exposed to and/or develop COVID-19 and must undergo mandatory quarantine will need to notify lead faculty and report their status to Jackson College immediately. COVID-19 affected students who miss $\geq 50\%$ of the required clinical time and are in good standing (course grade $\geq 78\%$) may be eligible for an incomplete grade as the live clinical component cannot be substituted with alternative assignments to exceed 50%.

An incomplete grade will allow students to complete the remaining course requirements after the semester or session has ended. Students with an incomplete grade will be unable to progress through the program until all remaining components are satisfactorily completed. The remaining work may not be available for completion until the course is offered at a future date.

In courses that have scheduled live and/or synchronous clinical experiences, students who miss $\geq 50\%$ of the required clinical time and are in poor standing (course grade $\leq 77\%$ or lower) will be dismissed with a grade of 1.5 in the course as the live clinical component cannot be substituted with alternative assignments to exceed 50%. Students can petition for re-admission according to the department policy. This occurrence will be counted as a one-course failure in the program.

Attendance- Participation Policy

Regular class participation and keeping up on the reading and assignments is strongly correlated with survival in college. It is my recommendation that you plan to do your assignments and take your exams BEFORE the last day they are due. If problems occur, there is time to fix them before the deadline.

In compliance with Federal Title IV funding requirements, as well as college initiatives, I will be monitoring student participation on a regular basis and officially reporting student activity throughout the term to assure compliance with college policy and federal regulations. It is imperative that you log in to the course and actively participate within the first couple of days of the term to validate your enrollment in the course. After that, not actively participating in class may result in you being withdrawn from the course. Being withdrawn from a course can have an impact on financial aid, billing, athletic eligibility, and housing status. As a college student you are responsible for how your participation impacts your academic progress; the accountability lies with you.

Caveat

Please note: The format and timing of this course may need to change due to unforeseen circumstances. In particular: school closings, instructor illness, weather, or other situations that may arise.

If you are taking an in -person class, you will be required to complete a Reintegration Video Training course in JetNet prior to being admitted to campus.

All COVID safety protocols in place are based on current guidelines and will be enforced while students are on campus.

Standardized Testing

The use of ATI (Assessment Technologies Institute) resources will be incorporated into this course.
